Presbyterians and Human Sexuality

At its General Assembly in June, the Presbyterian Church in Canada (PCC) will revisit our official position on sexual orientation and human sexuality. Since this topic is bound to be controversial, St. Paul's Session thought it was important for the congregation to be fully briefed.

Currently, the view of the national church is that homosexual orientation is innate and is not a sin, but homosexual practice is. As a result, homosexuals are barred from ordination unless they are celibate and same-sex couples cannot be married or have their relationships blessed in a Presbyterian worship service.

The views of society and many Christians, however, have changed since this policy was adopted over twenty years ago.

After profound study and prayerful reflection, several of PCC's ecumenical partners have chosen to follow a different path. These include - the Presbyterian Church USA, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Canada, the Anglican Church of Canada and the Church of Scotland.

This summer, an open letter asking the PCC to reconsider its stance of human sexuality was circulated across the country. It was signed by over 600 elders and ministers.

As a result, the Presbyteries of East Toronto, Waterloo-Wellington and Calgary-Macleod all passed motions to put the matter on the agenda of our national AGM in June.

Though they all differ slightly in their wording, the resolutions call on the Presbyterian Church in Canada to be fully inclusive of every person regardless of their sexual orientation and gender identity. This would cover all aspects of church life including calling, designation, ordination and marriage.

In a separate overture to General Assembly, the Presbytery of Calgary-MacLeod also asked that the authority of presbyteries and sessions be respected. Namely to discern whether someone is called to ministry and to determine who can be married within their church building.

If you are interested in reading the full report on human sexuality, please contact the minister or an elder. The newsletter will also be following the

issue closely and provide an update to the congregation after General Assembly meets in June.

In the meantime, please consider the following questions as you reflect and pray about this important subject:

- On a scale of I-10, what weight do the following factors have in how you interpret the Bible's teaching? Holy Spirit; Human Experience; Science; the Views of Sister Churches; Changing Government Policy; Evolution of Human Rights; and, Traditional versus Modern Theological Interpretation.
- 2) Living Faith 5:4 states "The Bible is to be understood in the light of the revelation of God's work in Christ. The writing of the Bible was conditioned by the language, thought, and setting of its time. The Bible must be read in its historical context. We interpret Scripture as we compare passages, seeing the two Testaments in light of each other, and listening to commentators past and present. Relying on the Holy Spirit we seek the application of God's word for our time."
 - How do you determine which biblical laws related to gender, sex, diet, property, cleanliness, etc., are still applicable and which are not?
- 3) In matters of sexuality, do you believe the Bible: a) Is limited by cultural prejudices of the ancient Middle East, but provides principles for right relationships based on love, mutuality, equality, respect and freedom to be different? Or b) Offers specific/literal teaching true for all times and places beyond any cultural influence?
- 4) Since the PCC began, the church has changed its mind on the Pope, the institution of slavery, divorce, the status of women and aboriginal people. It has changed its mind on accepting that people have different sexual orientations. Should it change its mind on accepting people in samesex relations or who have different sexual orientations in all aspects of ministry?
